enough to drive her 252 pound hog in the Elizabethtown Fair show ring, went home with the top prize. Sarah Boyd, the nine-year-old

daughter of Kerry and Deb Boyd, Ephrata, showed the grand champion named "Hubbie," Tuesday evening, to open the week's activities. Sarah is in the fourth grade at Clay Elementary school. The champion, a Yorkshire, Hampshire, Duroc crossbred from Strauss Brothers farm, was the top pick of Judge Dave Hartman in the heavyweight division.

Reserve grand champion honors went to Doug Musser, 19, on his Hampshire hog that topped the middleweight division. Doug is the son of Harold and Judy Musser, Elizabethtown and a sophomore at Penn State's York campus.
