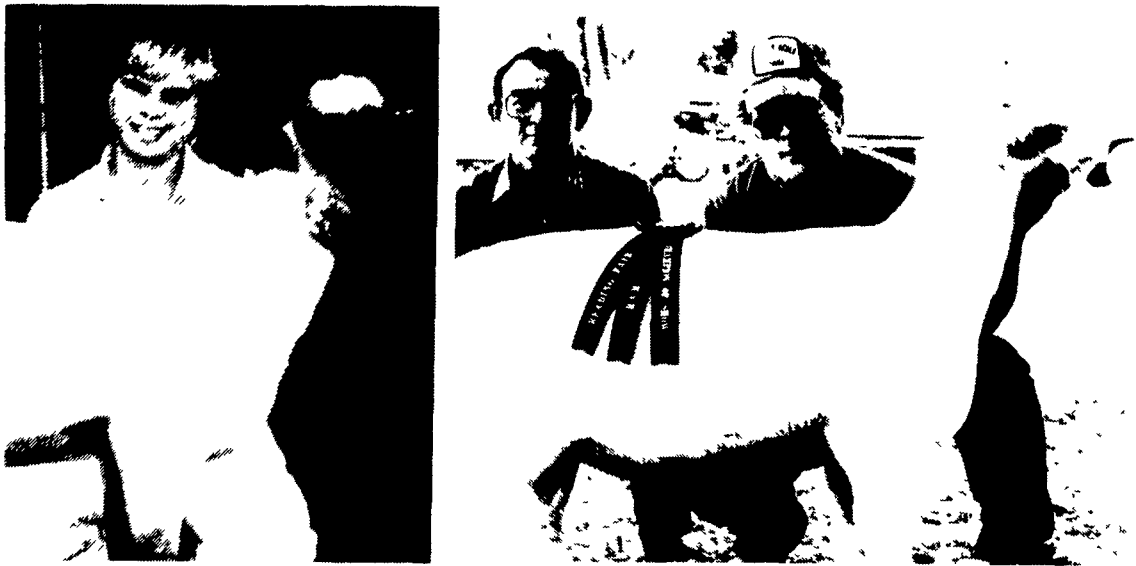

READING (Berks Co.) — Amy Eshelman, 16, who has exhibited sheep for about seven years, finally saw some results pay off — handsomely — at the Reading Fair on Monday afternoon.

Amy picked up lots of ribbons, including one for grand champion ewe, grand champion fitter, and champion Oxford ewe. She also

picked up awards for several reserve champions, including reserve market lamb lightweight, reserve heavyweight, and reserve breed champion Suffolk.

Amy competed against 26 other exhibitors in a show featuring a total of 125 sheep. Of those, 85 were breed sheep and 40 market lambs.

QUARRYVILLE (Lancaster Co.) — The two-day dairy show at Solanco Fair this week featured a large number of head in the Holstein, Ayrshire and Jersey breeds. Only three Brown Swiss were shown and no Guernseys.

In the Jersey show Wednesday, Tom Arrowsmith, Peach Bottom, walked away with all the major

championships by taking the grand, reserve grand and junior champion honors and was part owner of the reserve junior champion with Danny Sezerzon. In addition, Arrowsmith was named premier exhibitor and premier breeder.

Judge for the colored breeds was John Howard, a Willow Street dairyman.

In the Ayrshire show, Rob and Bonnie Wentworth, Quarryville,

took the grand, reserve grand, and reserve junior champion honors. Mark and Kris Voth, Quarryville, had the junior champion. The Charles Young family from West Grove was named premier breeder and premier exhibitor.

Richard Lieske, a Maryland breeder, took home all the championship honors with this three Brown Swiss entries.

Pa. Livestock Association Endowment Funds 4-H Team

UNIVERSITY PARK (Centre Co.) — The Pennsylvania Livestock Association has donated the first \$2,500 installment of a \$25,000 pledge to the Pennsylvania Livestock Association 4-H Judging Team Endowment Fund. The gift was made through the Pennsylvania Friends of 4-H.

"The endowment fund was established in 1986 to support state 4-H livestock, horse and meats judging teams as they travel to regional and national 4-H livestock judging competitions," said James Gallagher, Penn State professor of animal science and Pennsylvania Livestock Association board member.

The association donates thousands of dollars each year to various agricultural youth and adult activities, including the Penn State Livestock Judging Team, Penn State Block and Bridle Club, Pennsylvania Meat Marketing Program, and the Keystone International Livestock Exposition.

"We feel strongly that young people should be encouraged and rewarded for participating in activities that promote leadership, scholarship and responsibility," said Gallagher.

The Pennsylvania Friends of 4-H provides private support to recognize outstanding 4-H members, to develop volunteer leaders, and to enhance the 4-H program.
