Shepherds Symposium Scheduled

UNIVERSITY PARK (Centre Co.) — Should lambs be forage or grain fed for the marketplace? This important question will be addressed at the Shepherd's Symposium December 7-9 in Lancaster, Pa.

Panel members include Dr. Paul Lynch, ruminant research scientist, USDA, Beltsville, Md.; Dr. Curt Terry, director of lamb marketing, American Sheep Industry Council, Denver, Colo.; and Michelle Davia, Vermont Country Lamb, Inc., Orwell, Vt. Sheep health, breeding, and management sessions will focus on the latest strategies for a more profitable sheep enterprise.

Dr. Robert Smith, Penn State veterinarian, will present a sheep health update, including mastitis treatment in ewes and the BSE/Scrapie issue.

Sheep producer Peter Wood of

Blanchardville, Wis., will discuss how to earn a living entirely from sheep. Wood and his family have developed specific forage/animal production systems and marketing strategies for a profitable small flock enterprise.

The Penn State forage-analysis van will be at the symposium December 7 and 8. A workshop will be held on how to interpret and use the feed analysis report in lamb and winter ewe feeding programs.

Producers should bring their forage and grain supplements for analysis. The \$8 per sample charge could result in substantial savings in winter feed costs.
