Statler was honored at the banquet as one of the club's three graduating members. He showed several weight class champions during his 4-H career, and always showed steers from his family's Charolais herd.

He concluded his remarks by thanking club leader Leon Lebo and Penn State Cooperative Extension Agent William Reagan. "It was a pleasure being in a club with a leader and agent who gave us so much support."

Another graduating member, Jody Hawbaker, 19, also spoke about her 4-H experiences. The Mercersburg resident said that when she joined the club five years ago, "I didn't know what I was getting into. One steer ran through the cornfield for me, and one kept going in circles at roundup." Her years in 4-H were "a fun learning experience," she said. Hawbaker is presently a secretary at Foremost Industries.

Also graduating, from the club was Eric Sheiss, Chambersburg, a freshman biology major at Johns Hopkins. Sheiss, 18, who was a 4-H member for 10 years, was unable to attend the dinner.

The Baby Beef Club holds the dinner annually to thank the buyers of its steers and the sponsors of its awards.


