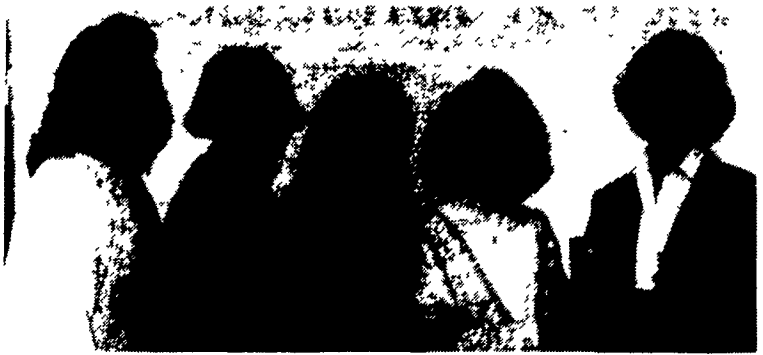
Connie is a freshman at Penn State, where she is majoring in horticulture with a minor in theater
