Chester Farm Association Attends PFA Training Session

MALVERN (Chester Co.) ---Chester/Delaware Farmers' Association was represented by 14 members of county legislative committees at the Pennsylvania Farmers' Association Region 3 training session held recently at Morgantown.

"It is mandatory that farmers stay current with vital legislative issues that can affect their farming operation and their income," said Robert Lange, Legislative Committee chairman. "Local committees are the voices of agriculture to represent farmer interests in Harrisburg and Washington.

"Farmers must speak for themselves. They have much to gain or loose when 10 percent of the

5,000 bills introduced in the Pennsylvania General Assembly last year had a potential impact on farmers," he said.

"The 694 members of the Chester/Delaware Farmers' Association can help in supporting Pennsylvania Farmers' Association and American Farm Bureau Policy," Lange said. "They should write letters and call legislators on any issue. Make their opinions known. Phone calls and letters are often tabulated by a legislator to determine his position on an issue.

"Legislative committees are composed of three members who live in the legislative district," Lange said. "The chairman and second member of the committee are of the same political party as the legislator while the third member belongs to the opposite party".

Lange urged that any farmer not now affiliated with the Chester/ Delaware Farmers' Association to contact the local director.

Mel Eckhaus and Fred Kerr of the Pennsylvania Farmers' Association conducted the meeting. Topics covered were 1) what are the most effective ways of influencing your legislator? 2) What should you keep in mind when meeting with your legisator? 3) tips for writing letters; 4) what you should consider when calling your legislator; and 5) why you should get to know the staff of your legislator.
