SPRING GROVE (York Co.) — Mr. Leroy Walker of New Freedom was the big wirmer at the 1991 York County Corn Clinic held on Jan. 23 at The York County 4-H Center.

Mr. Walker won one week's free use of a new 120 H.P. John Deere 4255 tractor. This prize was sponsored by York Farm Credit and Waltemyer's Sales & Service Inc., of Red Lion.

Mr. & Mrs. Walker are dairy farmers in the New Freedom area and currently milk 80 cows and till over 200 acres.

"We just recently started farming on our own," said Leroy, "and an additional tractor to use for spring time work this year will help us a lot."
