Also, "Mom and I are in a joint effort in picking out bulls for the breeding program," Terry said.

"We're really excited about the state wins, especially since both teams are from Lebanon," Hill said. "We hope to do better than we did last year."

"This year, hopefully we will know more what to expect, what kinds of questions they will be asking," she said.

"We're going to start practicing heavily in March. It's a little hard to get together to practice because Dave and Angie are both in college."

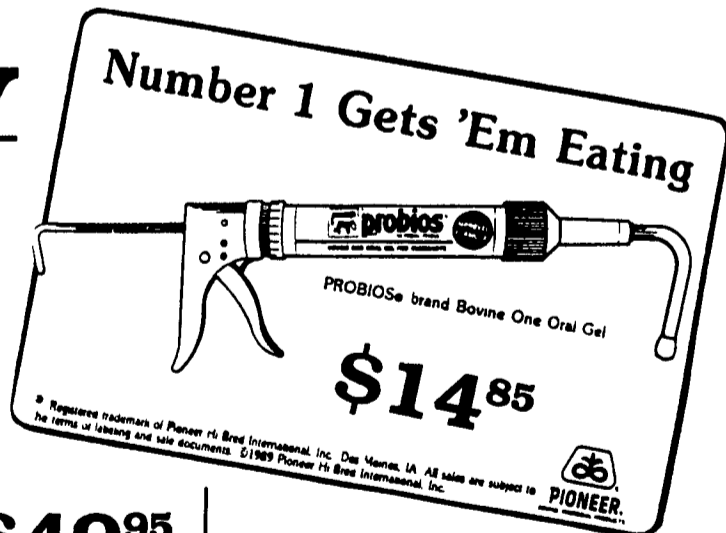

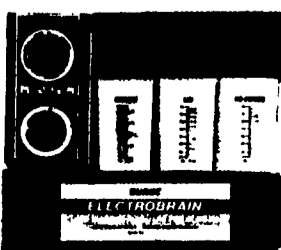
