#### National Egg Market Feb. 20, 1991

Prices were higher in the Midwest, unchanged to higher in the Northeast, and unchanged elsewhere. The market tone was steady to firm Cartoned and loose egg demand was fair to occasionally good. Wholesale packer and distributor inquiry was generally active for the limited and confidently held offerings. Primary inquiry was for graded and ungraded heavy eggs. Floor stocks for regular business were about adequate. Breakers provided mostly moderate demand for shell eggs, and prices were generally higher. Live hen supplies were adequate for the light to moderate

demand under a barely steady to steady market tone.

#### New York Eggs Feb. 20, 1991

Prices were higher. Trade sentiment was steady to firm. Retail demand was mixed from light to fairly good, best where features were a factor. Inter- dealer inquiry was fairly active for the very limited offerings, and current negotiated trades were at premiums. Floor stocks were about adequate.
