INTRADEALER TRADING OF UNGRADED AND GRADED LOOSE EGGS INCREASED SLIGHTLY WITH THE LARGEST SIZES SOUGHT MOST, AND MEDIUM SALES USUALLY AT DISCOUNT. 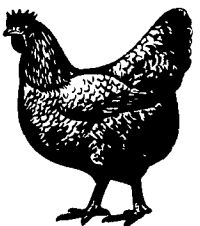
