Tobacco Growers Burning Over Tax Proposal

Co.) — Self-described as politically aloof, a large number of tobacco growers have said they strongly oppose attempts by state Gov. Robert Casey to thwart a burgeoning state deficit by increasing taxes on all tobacco products.


The proposal would raise the tax on a pack of cigarettes from 18 cents to 48 cents.

On Tuesday, 43 tobacco growers — most of whom are members of religious sects which normally avoid political involvement - spent several hours in the Capital building meeting with senators and representatives to discuss Casey's proposed tobacco tax and state budget options.

The growers, mainly from the west central portion of Lancaster County, met initially with tobacco industry lobbyists George Wolff and William Cornell Jr. The two lobbyists talked to the group about the importance of organizing and making themselves be heard.

Immediately after the introduction of Wolff and Cornell to the representatives of the PTGA, the group had a chance to talk with four state senators and seven representatives, lead by Sen. Noah
