Prices were generally lower on mediums in the Northeast and Midwest, balance unchanged. Trade sentiment was steady to weak, mostly about steady on large, and barely steady to weak for mediums. Demand was mixed, and mostly moderate. Supplies of the large sizes were generally adequate, and mediums were adequate to ample. Breakers provided a light demand for the adequate supplies of heavy nest run, and the increased offerings of lighter weights. Live hen markets were steady in the Midwest, and fully steady to firm in the East and South Central areas where offerings were short of the good demand.
