Holstein Association, Anitech Introduce Electronic Cow I.D.

BRATTLEBORO, Vt. - Animal identification is about to enter the electronic age.

So claimed the CEO of the Holstein Association of America, Steve Kerr, who recently said the dairy industry is more than ready for new technology to reduce labor costs and build profit margins.

Kerr joined Anitech International Chairman Zane Akins at World Dairy Expo, Madison, in describing several applications of the Destron/IDI electronic transponder, which uses radio frequency identification technology.

The transponder, embedded in ordinary, plastic eartags for livestock, carries a 10 digit number which can be read by hand-held or gateway stationary readers.

The animal identification information can be coupled with automated milking and feeding systems already on farms, and used for record keeping by AI technicians, veterinarians and milk recording supervisors.

"We are helping dairymen achieve efficient management systems, and accurate animal identification is the key element for laborefficient record keeping. We believe it's necessary to actively support the advancement of electronic identification technology," Kerr said.

The Holstein executive said the association is looking forward to incorporating electronic identification in its registry and animal identification processes, herd classification, and performance information systems.

The Holstein Association is the nation's largest dairy breed organization. It registers and identifies nearly 400,000 Holsteins each year, and maintains a database of 16 million animal identities.

Akins, said Anitech International was able to advance the release date of electronic identification by embedding transponders in eartags, with which farmers are already familiar. They offer the advantage of visible identification, as well as communicate with electronic readers and computer systems.

Anitech is continuing to collect data on transponders implanted under the skin of animals, Akins said, and the Food and Drug Administration is reviewing the information for effects on animal and food safety

Some dairymen may favor the implants, once they're approved, Akins said, but the eartags are here now, and they are an inexpensive alternative to magnetic transponders.

Md. Seeks Hay, **Straw Producers** For Directory
