Year-End DHIA Production Records Released

STATE COLLEGE (Centre Co.)—Richlawn Sarah Transformer Stella, Ex 91, was reported the highest producer of milk in a lactation in Pennsylvania for the 1991 year ending in September. Owned by Smysers Richlawn Farms in York County, Stella was milked two times per day and had a high of 192 lbs. of milk per day. When her 7y11m laction was completed, she had the state record of 41,195m 1155f 1189p.

The year-end lactation reports were released this week from the State DHIA office.

Robert and Rodney Smyther run the Richlawn farm. They lead feed the dry cows 7 to 10 days before calving and challenge feed their cows in early lactation to obtain as high a peak production as possible. Corn silage and haylage are used as roughages. But Robert said it takes all the good management practices together to get a cow to produce at this high level.

The only other two cows over 40,000lbs. of milk were also in the Richlawn herd. Doreen had 40,393lbs. and Fond had 40,026lbs.

A Berks County Holstein had the top protein and fat records in the state. Three-year-old Plushanski Mark Fife ET produced 37,210m 3.5% 1303p 4.5% 1688f for Plushanski Farms at Kutztown in Berks County.
