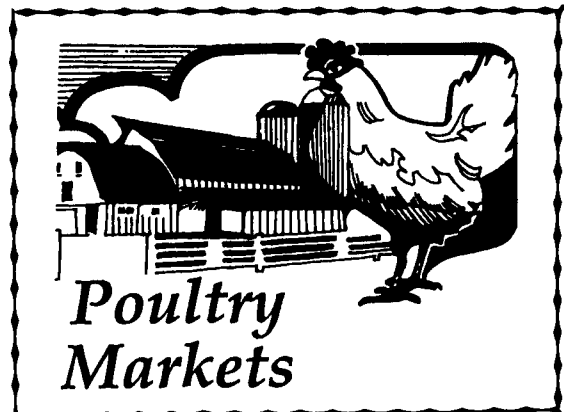

Prices were unchanged. The market tone was mostly steady. Demand was generally moderate, and covered the full range. Scattered features continued to enhance movement. Supplies were adequate, and occasionally barely adequate on mediums in the East, adequate in the Midwest, and adequate to ample on the West Coast. Most breakers restricted shell egg receipts to regular sources, and finished product sales remained sluggish. Live hen markets were fully steady to firm, and offerings were limited and short of the mostly good demand.

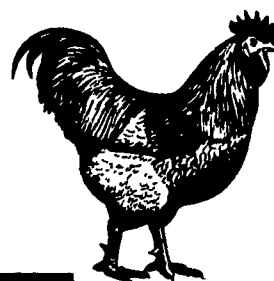
