World's Finest Sheep Compete At NAILE

LOUISVILLE, Ky. - The National Southdown Show and Shropshire Show were held recenily at the North American Lives tock Exposition.

The National Southdown Show became the largest Southdown event in the world, featuring 344 sheep in 23 classes of competition. Breeders in twenty-three states competed for \$10,000 in premiums.

Southdowns are a breed of small, hornless sheep characterized by having a dense, short, finetextured wool.

Gary Jennings, superintendent of the North American National

Southdown Show, said that the market for Southdowns, bred mainly for their meat, is doing fairly well.

"The sheep economy overall is not very good this year," Jennings said. "But we've had a good year in comparison to other breeds."

The North American International Livestock Exposition is the last Southdown show of the year, and attracts state fair champions from across the United States.

"You ask any sheep breeder anywhere," saidd Jennings. "To win Louisville is to win the big show."

John Mrozinski, judge of the

Southdown show, confirmed that this was the toughest competition in the country and believes it helps breeders a great deal from an economic standpoint. "People like the prestige of winning a national show like this," Mrozinski said. "Louisville gives people a chance to show offspring and sell animals for a better price than the standard market value."

Mrozinski said he judged Southdowns based on their body conformation in relation to their length of top, levelness of rump, amount of muscle, natural thickness, breed character and structural correctness.

"A lot of style and a sharp looking animal is also important," said Mrozinski.

The Shropshire Show was also a very competitive event, featuring 94 sheep in 16 classes. Breeders from throughout the country competed for \$3,215 in premiums.

Shropshire is a large, hornless, black-faced breed of sheep raised for meat and wool.

In comparison to Southdowns, Shropshires have larger body conformation, wool on the top of their heads, wool along their eyes, and should have a brownish-black color along their heads.

Brett Wittford, a worker for

Michael Anderson's Shropshire exhibition, stressed the importance of performing well in competitions such as the North American International Livestock Exposition.

"The better, we do at this show the more private sales we obtain at our farm," said Wittford

Ron Guenther, judge of the Shropshire show, said he was looking for Shropshires with good feeding legs, soundness, style, balance, and breeding standards. When asked to describe the level of competition among Shropshires at this event, Guenther said, "We're at the North American. It's only the best."



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Extension Seeks Nominations

Nomination of individuals to be considered for the awards can be made by any citizen of Warren County, and organizations or groups of individuals may also be nominated.


The awards are based largely upon activity and contributions made by the nominee in the


