## Pork Video Makes Grade With Teachers

CHICAGO, II. — Almost 40 percent of U.S. home economics teachers that use videos to educate students want a copy of the pork industry's first video kit on nutrition, preparation and animal care.

The Pork Industry Group's Around the World with Pork, funded by the pork checkoff through the National Pork Board, gives home economics students the knowledge about how to purchase, store and prepare pork as well as reassure them about how fresh pork fits into a hearthealthy diet. A segment with Illinois pork producer Bob Brauer also educates students about how animals are carefully raised to

provide wholesome products.

"This is a very appropriate time for the pork industry to get this message about its much improved nutritional profile and new cookery guidelines into the classroom. School education programs establish a positive foundation for industry efforts to increase consumer demand," says Lowell Gemar, Fullerton, N.D., chairman of the Meat Board Pork Industry Group Information Committee.

The kit consists of a 19-minute video, teacher's guide, reproducible student activity sheets, wall chart of pork cuts and an evaluation form used to help gauge the program's effectiveness.


