The Perry County Farm Women Society meets five times a year. They hold their annual fundraiser before Easter when they make 800 to 1,000 Easter eggs to sell. The group also makes lap robes for nursing homes. One of the members' favorite meetings is when each person brings a craft they have made to the meeting. After explaining how they made it, members exchanged their projects as presents with each other.
