Loan Programs For Disabled

NORTH CORNWALL (Lebanon Co.) — The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) has a loan program designed to help members of socially disadvantaged groups, including minorities, acquire land for farming.

Under the new program, FmHA is to try to find persons in these catagories who are interested in farming and can qualify for a

FmHA farm ownership loan.

The agency is also prepared to sell or lease a farm held in its inventory.

Additionally, the FmHA can also provide other loan and technical assistance, if needed, to help the borrower get started.

The program was included in the Agricultural Credit Act signed in 1987, and funds have been reserved for farm purchases based on the population of socially disadvantaged persons. Population groups involved are Hispanics, Native Americans, Blacks, Asians, and Pacific Islanders.


Leaders OK Deduction Increase

ORLANDO, Fla. — Sheep industry leaders representing 48 state associations okayed an increase in the promotion deduction that supports promotion of lamb and wool products.

Meeting at the American Sheep Industry Convention, ASI's producer board voted unanimously to ask the Secretary of Agriculture to up their deduction on wool incentive monies to seven cents per pound. The increase was spelled out in the 1991 sheep industry referendum and will take effect for 1992 payments on wool sold in 1991 if the secretary approves the request.

The increased funding will add \$1 million to the sheep industry promotion coffers, which stand at \$6.2 million for promotion. It also provides that 10 percent of all funding go back to state associations for promotion and marketing programs.

The promotion deduction in 1991 and 1990 was six cents per pound of wool and is deducted through the ASCS Wool Incentive
