## Casey Proposes Ag Cuts

HARRISBURG — Gov. Casey's budget remarks did not address agriculture, but a look at the proposed state spending plan shows major cuts for many programs, according to Sen. Edward Helfrick (R-27).

"Continued efforts to impress upon the governor that agriculture is one of the mainstays of the state's economy have not gotten through to him," said Helfrick, who noted that the governor's economic recovery remarks centered on programs based in Philadelphia and Pittsburgh.

The governor proposed cuts for agricultural research, agricultural promotion, the Farm Show, agricultural fairs and nutrient management under the state Department of Environmental Resources. Funding for mushroom promotion, emergency apple marketing, the Future Farmers, the School of Veterinary Medicine at the Uni-

versity of Pennsylvania, and the Milk Marketing Board is eliminated in the governor's plan.

"Farmers are forced to meet more and more mandates, but funding that would assist them continues to dwindle," said Helfrick, who chairs the Senate Agriculture and Rural Affairs Committee. "Passing over the state's most important industry and major exporter is going to cost the state dearly in the long run."

Helfrick acknowledged that Fiscal Year 1992-1993 would definitely be a tight budget year that requires spending reductions, but said he would be advocating cuts to different agencies and programs that he feels are outdated or superfluous, as well as pushing for privatization efforts and programs that would generate new revenue, such as the tax amnesty proposal passed by the Senate yesterday.




