The market tone was generally steady on white eggs with some cautiousness in the Midwest and West Coast, and, in New England, the undertone was barely steady to weak. Demand in all areas was light to moderate, best where features were in progress or planned. Supplies were adequate to ample, offerings were limited, and asking prices were steady. Breakers provided a light demand for the generally adequate shell egg offerings. Live hen offerings were light to adequate for the unaggressive to moderate demand, and the trade sentiment was unsettled and steady to weak.
