bers for producing premiumquality milk (low somatic cell count, clean test) for 12 straight months.

In other business, officials said that the business future of the cooperative seemed solid with contracts with two major different processors --- to 1996 with Johanna and 1999 with Beatrice.


Also, the new component pricing should not greatly change the overall price received by the cooperative for its milk, but will create some changes in the individual milk checks, which should be coming into producer hands soon.

Md. Grange Offers **Ag Scholarships**


