- Glen McDonald, Breeze Hill Farm. This is a top show herd in Eastern Ohio. They have excellent production as well as many excellent and very good dairy cows.
- Charles Farlinger, Seaway-

view Farm. This is a family farm of 50 milking cows. They also have high production as well as several excellent and very good dairy cows.

- Carl Smith, Sunny Lodge Farm. This is a high index herd with several bulls in AI. They have many cattle in international markets. They are an excellent show herd and have many excellent and very good cows.
- Alison Fawcett, Fawcettdale

Farm. This farm is also a high production/high type herd.

The above herds all contain many daughters of today's modern/popular bulls. All four farms are currently using manure storage systems.

The charter bus will pick up at two locations in Susquehanna County. The first pickup will be at the Lenox Exit of Route 81 across from the County Bank at 6:45 a.m. The second pickup will be in New

Milford at the Roller Skating Rink at 7 a.m. The group will be in Canada by 11:30 a.m.

Bring a bag lunch. Milk will be provided. To make a reservation, send a check payable to: "Susquehanna County Holstein Club" for \$20 per person. This trip is not limited to Holstein Club members. Reservation deadline is March 18.

On the return trip the group will be stopping for dinner at about 7 p.m. in New York, so bring money for dinner. Also, remember to bring some form of ID, in case this is needed when the group crosses Customs in Canada. (The usual forms of ID used are drivers license/voters registration, etc.)

Lancaster County Announces Scholarships

LANCASTER (Lancaster Co.) — One of the objectives of the Lancaster County Farm and Home Foundation is to encourage the higher education of the youth of Lancaster County. In this respect, the Foundation is announcing the offering of scholarship awards in 1992 in the fields of agriculture and home economics.

Each scholarship award will be in the amount of \$1,000 and may be used to help defray tuition, fees, or room and board expenses at any accredited educational institution, which offers a course of study in agriculture or home economics.

The Farm and Home Foundation Scholarships are made available through the earnings of an Irrevocable Trust Fund set up by the late Elmer L. Esben-shade, one of the founders of the Lancaster County Farm and Home Foundation. The income from this trust fund will be offered annually in the form of educational scholarships through the Farm and Home Foundation.

Scholarship applications are available from senior guidance counselors and vocational agriculture and home economics teachers in all school districts in Lancaster County.

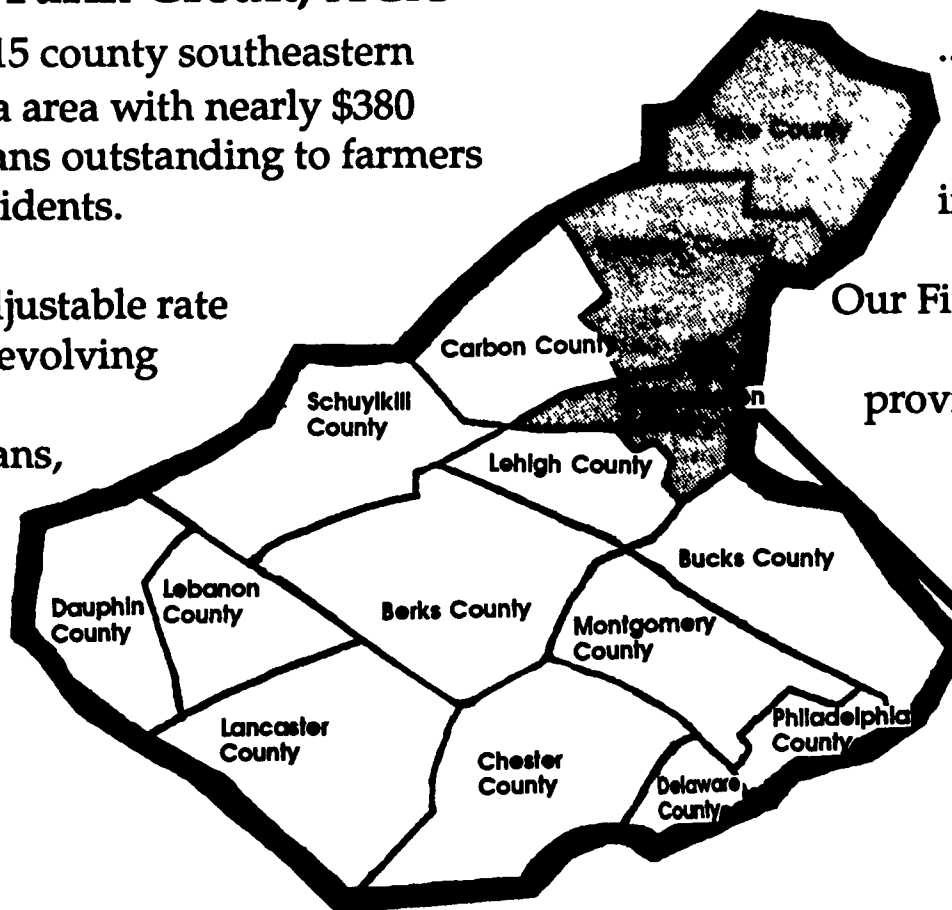
