

ARCH 25, 1911 the workday was nearly over at the Triangle Shirtwaist Company in New York when a disastrous fire wept through the premises. Most of the seamstresses were



young immigrant women who wouldn't have dared to complain about the deplorable working conditions. Although labor laws forbade locking factory doors while the workers were present many young women died in the fire because locked doors trapped them on the eighth and ninth floors. Some jumped to their death when fire engine ladders were inade quate to reach them. When it was over more than 145 workers had died as a result of the

This terrible tragedy is also remembered as a turning point in labor history as it resulted in many needed health and salety reforms, as well as efforts to improve fire-fighting equipment Fire and ashes are but sad reformers.






