National Egg Market April 1, 1992

Prices were unchanged. Trade sentiment was mostly steady with a cautiousness looming in several areas. Cartoned egg movement improved in some quarters but was for the most part still only fair at best and demand was expected to continually improve with the advent of retail promotional activity and holiday buying interest. Supplies were generally fully adequate for current dealer interest. Breakers were unaggressive as finished product sales continued to drag and inventories were becoming a little uncomfortable at present levels.
