Live supplies were moderate overall; weights were desirable to mostly heavy. Processing schedules were heavy. The undertone was firm to higher. In the part complex, whole breasts were short and boneless skinless were in tight supply. Leg quarters were in active demand and firmly held. Boneless thighs were in good demand. Other parts were about adequate with wings in the heaviest position.

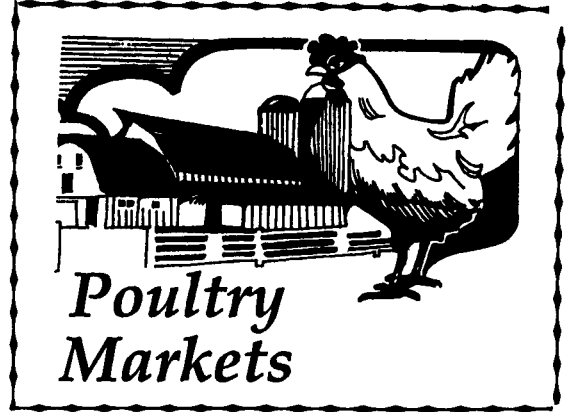

Demand for yellow skin leg quarters for late week and for next week needs was good and improving. Product booked this morning was at 23 - 24 cents. Buyer interest in wings improved over prior week, but product was available and a push to clear the market at steady prices.
