Movement of ready-to-cook whole birds remained moderate to good; however, advance interest was slow in developing. Supplies of whole birds were uneven but

fully adequate overall. Less than trucklot asking prices were generally higher at 59 to 69 cents but premiums were not fully applied in several instances. Live supplies were moderate. Weights ranged desirable to heavy. Slaughter schedules were heavy and the majority of plants were projecting no operations on the upcoming Monday holiday. The market tone was steady at best. In the parts complex, buying interest was less aggressive and highly selective.

Trading was reported at higher prices. Legs and wings were in good balance at steady prices. Thighs were slow to clear at lower trending prices.
