DAILY NATIONAL GRAIN SUMMARY  
WEATHER CONDITIONS SEEMS TO HAVE SHIFTED, MOVING WET WEATHER OUT OF SOUTH AND INTO MIDWEST AREAS. WHEAT 2 TO 3 CENTS LOWER AND UP TO 21 CENTS LOWER IN MINNEAPOLIS. CORN MOSTLY STEADY. SORGHUM STEADY TO 1 CENT LOWER. SOYBEANS 4 TO 5 CENTS LOWER. WHEAT PRICES DECLINED ON IDEAS DRIER WEATHER FORCAST FOR SOUTHERN U.S. HARD RED WINTER WHEAT AREAS WOULD ALLOW HARVEST TO RESUME. SPOT CUTTING IN AREAS OF SOUTHERN OKLAHOMA AND TEXAS SHOWING LIGHTER TEST WEIGHTS BUT SPOUT DAMAGE NOT AS EXTENSIVE IN OKLAHOMA AS IN TEXAS. PAKISTAN'S LARGE WHEAT PURCHASE ALREADY FACTORED INTO MARKET EARLIER THIS WEEK, ADDING LITTLE SUPPORT TO PRICES. CORN PRICES CLOSED FRACTIONALLY LOWER; SOYBEANS MODERATELY LOWER, INFLUENCED BY RECENT RAINS OVER MIDWEST AREAS. TRADERS ALSO SQUARING POSITIONS BEFORE TODAY'S RELEASE OF USDA'S SUPPLY AND DEMAND REPORT. LONG-TERM OUTLOOK STILL CALLING FOR DRIER THAN-NORMAL CONDITIONS THIS SUMMER IN MIDWEST, UNDERPINNED PRICES. USDA'S CROP PRODUCTION REPORT FORECAST WINTER WHEAT PRODUCTION AT 1.54 BILLION BUSHEL, DOWN 5 PERCENT FROM MAY 1 BUT 12 PERCENT MORE THAN 1991 CROP. FEWER ACRES FOR GRAIN COUPLED WITH LOWER

YIELDS CAUSED DECLINE FROM LAST MONTH.

Prices were unchanged to higher on the large sizes in the Northeast and Midwest, unchanged on the balance. The market tone continued steady to firm, strongest on the large sizes. Demand ranged fair to good, and was best where featured. Supplies were tight to adequate on the large sizes, and lighter weights were generally adequate. Breaking stock supplies were usually adequate from regular sources, and additional purchases were at steady to higher prices. Live hen markets were generally steady to instances fully steady, and sup-

plies were barely adequate to fully adequate for the mixed but mostly moderate demand.

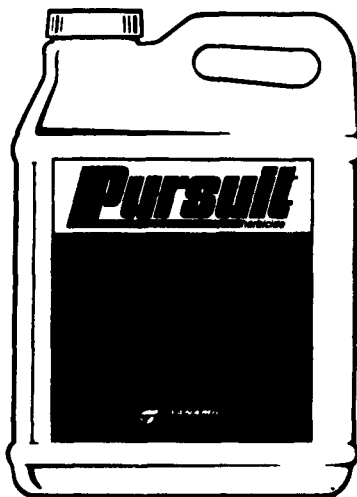
**New York & Philadelphia Frozen Eggs Report**
