WEATHER CONDITIONS SEEMS TO HAVE SHIFTED, MOVING WET WEATHER OUT OF SOUTH AND INTO MIDWEST AREAS. WHEAT 2 TO 3 CENTS LOWER AND UP TO 21 CENTS LOWER IN MINNEAPOLIS. CORN MOSTLY STEADY. SORGHUM STEADY TO 1 CENT LOWER. SOY-BEANS 4 TO 5 CENTS LOWER. WHEAT PRICES DECLINED ON IDEAS DRIER WEATHER FORCAST FOR SOUTHERN U.S. HARD RED WINTER WHEAT AREAS WOULD ALLOW HARVEST TO RESUME. SPOT CUTTING IN AREAS OF SOUTHERN OKLAHOMA AND TEXAS SHOWING LIGHTER TEST WEIGHTS BUT SPR-OUT DAMAGE NOT AS EXTENSIVE IN OKLAHOMA AS IN TEXAS. PAKIS-TAN'S LARGE WHEAT PURCHASE ALREADY FACTORED INTO MARK-ET EARLIER THIS WEEK, ADDING LITTLE SUPPORT TO PRICES. 
