Movement of yellow U.S. Grade A whole birds was no better than fair overall. Supplies were adequate on 3 pound and lighter weights, fully adequate to ample on the larger sizes. Less than trucklot asking prices were unchanged to 1 cent higher at 49 to 60 cents. Live supplies were moderate. Weights varied, but were mostly desirable to heavy. Slaughter schedules were heavy. The undertone was fully steady on yellow birds; firm to higher on supplies of white. Parts continued in better demand than whole birds, particularly bone in breasts. Leg quarters were firm and demand for wings was improving.

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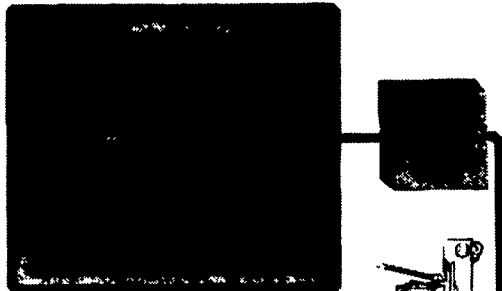

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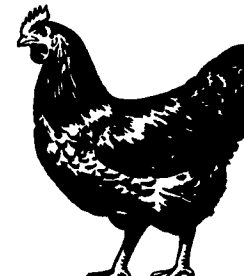
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
