he Summer Solstice, the first day of summer in the northern hemisphere, arrives on June 20, at 10:14 P.M EST, when the Sun reaches the Tropic of Cancer, (23 ½° north latitude) People who live at this latitude (in the town of Georgetown in the Bahamas, for instance) see the Sun directly overhead at noon The rest of us notice that the Sun is higher in the sky throughout the day, and its rays strike the earth at more direct angle, causing the more efficient warming we call summer. In the winter, just the opposite occurs the Sun, at 231/2° south latitude, is low in the sky as seen from the northern hemisphere and its rays hit the earth at an oblique angle, creating the feeble sunlight we expect in winter

nome cleaning jobs require dry cleaning, or rather ab-Usorbing Here are some ba sic, no-trills absorbing powders. Tale and cornstarch are so dry, they can slurp up wet spots on carpets. Fuller's earth (available in brown or white) is clav-like and good for removing greasy spots on cloth or carpets Sprinkle on leave for a few hours, then scrape up or vacuum the light crust that forms Baking soda absorbs odors in the air (your refrigerator, musty suitcases) or in carpets (sprinkle on, leave for an hour

then vacuum)

1 pound young beet greens, cut off 1 to 2 inches from root ½ cup boiling water ¼ teaspoon salt butter

ash the greens in several changes of clean water Drain and place in rapidly boiling salted water Cover saucepan

and cook for six to ten minutes over medium high heat Drain greens and chop fine Serve with butter and cream


