walked away with some money in their pockets after the 13th annual Robert L. Finkenbider FFA Livestock Sale at the Shippensburg Community Fair.

The grandchampion market steer, owned by Eric Berkheimer of Cumberland Valley High School, weighed in at 1,110 pounds. It was bought

by CCNB Bank for \$4.60 a pound.

The reserve grand champion steer was a 990-pounder owned by Todd Rabert, also of Cumberland Valley. Rabert's animal sold for \$2.40 a pound to Hoss' Steak House.

In the market goat sale, the grand champion, weighing in at 70 pounds, was owned by Andy Rook of Big Spring High School. That goat was

purchased by Bill Piper for \$2 a pound.

The reserve champion market goat was a 73-pound animal owned by Mike Cornman of Big Spring. It was bought by Penn Shire LaMandhas for \$1.50 a pound.

Mike Cornman earned more money in the market lamb sale. He had the grand champion animal in that event, a 119-pound lamb that was purchased for \$2.10 a pound by Rick Fogelsanger for the G.L. Fogelsanger Agency.

The reserve grand champion market lamb was a 114-pound animal owned by Megan Souder of Cumberland Valley. Her animal sold for \$1.35 a pound to Jeff Craig for the Greencastle Livestock Market.

Mike Cornman again did well in the market swine sale, where he had the grand champion hog. That animal, weighing in at 230 pounds, was bought by Wayne F. Craig and Sons for \$2.05 a pound.

The reserve grand champion market hog, a 235-pound animal owned by Brian Goodhart of Shippensburg High School, was purchased by Kevin Campbell for the Shippensburg Agway Farm Center for \$2.05 a pound.

Horse Show Dates Set For NAILE

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — Class offerings and dates for the 1992 North American International Livestock Exposition (NAILE) Quarter Horse Show are now confirmed.

This year three AQHA events have been added to the already impressive offering: amateur calf roping, amateur steer roping (heading), and amateur steer roping (heeling). The dates for this year's Quarter Horse Show are November 6-12.

Another change is the modification of existing classes. AQHA youth mares and geldings classes will be split. The North American Calf Roping Classic has a new fee and payback schedule and dally team roping, 40 years and over, will include a finals round for the top 10 competitors.

The 1992 schedule will be similar to that of 1991. The major change in this area involves movement of some classes previously

held on Monday to Sunday in order to accommodate an earlier start for the NAILE team penning on Monday afternoon. Last year's team penning event spanned nearly 12 hours. This year it will start at noon on Monday, November 9. Premiums in 1991 were nearly \$12,000. They are expected to be even larger this year.

All National Cutting Horse Association classes will be held on Friday, November 6. Youth events are scheduled for the weekend, November 7 and 8, to better accommodate youngsters' school schedules.

Premiums for the entire Quarter Horse Show now exceed \$50,000, and the show consistently ranks in the top five of those held in the United States. The entry deadline is October 31, 1992; post entries are double. Premium List and entry forms can be requested by calling (502)-588-3166 or by writing NAILE, P.O. Box 36367, Louisville, KY 40233.

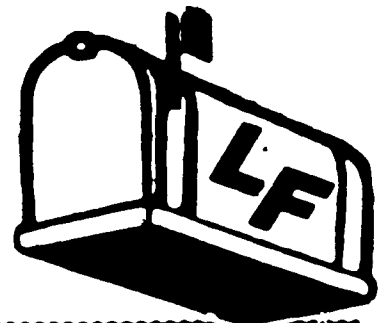
