LANCASTER (Lancaster Co.) - Newly crowned Pennsylvania Poultry Oueen Melissa Dawn Yoder says she has something to sing about — "two large eggs contain only 164 calories and there's a 22 percent decrease in egg cholesterol."

That was the message Melissa told 225 people as she and two other contestants vied for the state title during the annual Lancaster County Poultry Queen Pageant held on August 7, at the Farm and Home Center.

In a skit portraying Johann Sebastian Bach, Melissa, an accomplished pianist, played a minuet and talked about starting the day with eggs, which enables her to compose music all day long.

She and the other contestants had to answer the impromptu question posed by Grover Gouker, master of ceremonies: "You have just

been appointed teen-age advisor in President Bush's cabinet. As a representative of your generation, what advice would you give President Bush?

Melissa did not pause long before she answered, "I would like to tell him that I want to live in a generation of peace.... I would tell him to cut the budget spending especially the nuclear war research, because I would like to live in a generation of peace."


In the fall, Melissa will be a senior at Lancaster Mennonite High. She wants to be a music teacher, and has played the piano for more than 10 years.
