Lancaster Farming, Saturday, August 29, 1992-A5

BEAN PRICE ADVANCES WERE HALTED, WEDNESDAY, ON SLOWED EXPORT DEMAND AND FAVORABLE WEATHER OUTLOOK. WHEAT MIXED, STEADY TO 8 CENTS LOWER EXCEPT PORTLAND 2 TO 3 CENTS HIGHER. CORN 1 TO 3 CENTS LOWER. SORGHUM 3 TO 5 CENTS LOWER. SOYBEANS 1 TO 7 CENTS LOWER. WHEAT PRICES WERE PRESSURED AFTER U.S. SUBSIDIES FAILED TO SURFACE. DRIER WEATHER FORECASTS THROUGH WEEKEND IN SPRING WHEAT AREAS WILL ALLOW FARMERS TO RESUME HARVEST. CORN AND SOYBEAN PRICES FELL DUE TO LET UP IN EXPORT DEMAND AND RAINY MIDWEST OUTLOOK.
