WASHINGTON, D.C. — A new 29-minute television program

features successful farmers and ranchers from around the country who are showing the economic, cultural, and environmental benefits of good land and water resource conservation.

It also includes heavy emphasis on protecting the nation's water resources from potential agricultural pollutants.

The video was released by William Richards, chief of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service (SCS), and William Reilly, administrator of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). Produced with the nonprofit organization Winrock International, the video is for general interest, environmental, and agricultural audiences.

Richards noted that the two agencies have worked together for some time. SCS has assigned a water quality specialist to each EPA region. Both SCS and EPA see the video as one of many common efforts toward conserving the nation's natural resources.

Raymond Burr narrates the video. Burr has a 40-acre farm in California, where he grows grapes and orchids, and raises sheep. As a farmer, he said he is pleased to have had a part in making a video that portrays U.S. farmers' concern for wildlife, the environment, and for sustaining America's agricultural base for future generations.

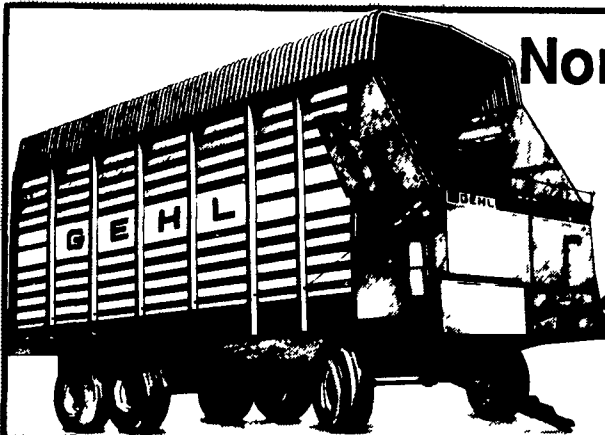
