USDA DAILY NATIONAL GRAIN SUMMARY WHEAT PRICES EXTENDED GAINS, WEDNESDAY, ON RUSSIAN EXPORT INTENTIONS; CORN AND SOYBEAN PRICES FELL SHARPLY ON CHANGE IN WEATHER OUTLOOK. WHEAT STEADY TO 6 CENTS HIGHER. CORN 3 TO 4 CENTS LOWER. SORGHUM 4 TO 7 CENTS LOWER. SOYBEANS 4 TO 5 CENTS LOWER. GOOD EXPORT DEMAND, ESPECIALLY FROM JAPAN, AND ANTICIPATION FOR RUSSIAN CREDIT ANNOUNCEMENT KEPT WHEAT PRICES ON UP-HILL CLIMB. HOWEVER, TRADERS DISAPPOINTMENT IN DELAYED DETAIL ANNOUNCEMENT, LIMITED GAINS. SETBACK IN SPRING WHEAT HARVEST ADDED TO WHEAT PRICE SUPPORT. CORN AND SOYBEAN PRICES REVERSED DIRECTION ON UPDATED WEATHER FORECAST WHICH OMITTED CHANCE OF FROST AT THIS TIME IN MIDWEST AREAS AND PRICES FELL.

EXPORT NEWS: THE PHILIPPINES BOUGHT 40,000 TONNES U.S. WHEAT UNDER EEP FOR OCTOBER BANGLADESH BOUGHT 10,000 TONNES U.S. SPRING WHEAT UNDER EEP FOR SEPTEMBER. JAPAN BOUGHT 152,400 TONNES WHEAT FOR NOVEMBER SHIPMENT. TAIWAN BOUGHT 20,000 TONNES U.S. NO. 2 YELLOW CORN FOR OCTOBER SHIPMENT.

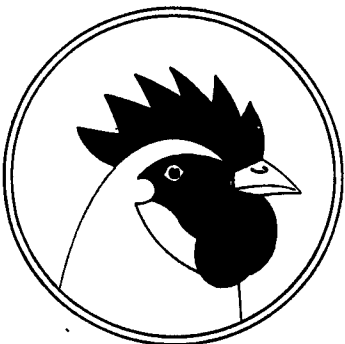

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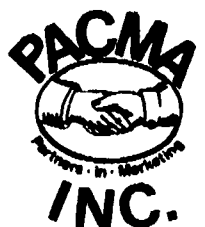

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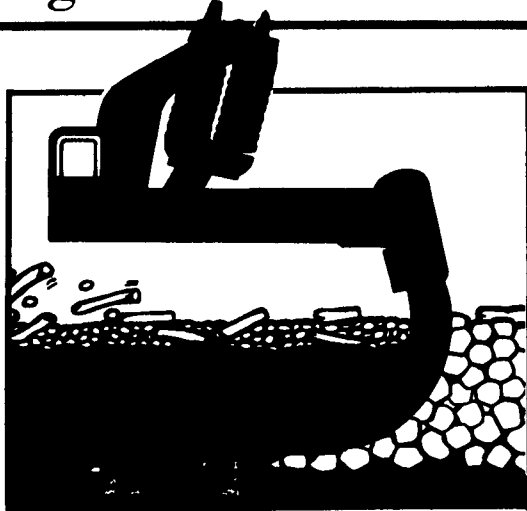
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
