Live supplies were moderate to light; weights were light to desirable. Less than trucklot asking prices were generally unchanged at 51 to 61 cents; however, some light sizes were available as low as 48 cents. Trade sentiment was about steady. Breast items remained available to a light and selective demand. Leg items continued to tighten, particularly leg quarters. Wings were fully adequate.

Demand continued light to instances fairly good with the best call where features were in progress or planned for first of the month. Supplies of larger sizes were adequate to ample, mediums were adequate. Demand for light type hens was fair to good; supplies were in close balance; the trade sentiment was steady.
