The amount of sight-seeing and culture they saw for one week was impressive. They listened to a jazz band while lunching at the Kennedy Center. They saw a nighttime view of Washington D.C., including the Jefferson and Lincoln Memorials. Union Station was another favorite with its big mall and old train station. They had opportunities to create their own culture. The group had an "Expressive Arts Show," which gave the youth a chance to share their talents. Damon Fisher from Pennsylvania played an impressive "Fast Blues in B Flat" with his trombone.

Back at home, Diane is a senior at Boiling Springs High School. She is the daughter of Richard and Ethel Myers. 


