of the Pennsylvania Milk Marketing Board (the PMMB regulates drinking milk prices to farmers and shelf prices in non-farm retail stores), has devoted more than 50 years of his life to the promotion of the agricultural industry.

He was commended by Keith Eckel, PFA president who was reelected to a sixth consecutive twoyear term, before about 600 people attending the banquet.

Wilkinson has been a PFA member for more than 40 years, serving on numerous committees and currently serving on the PFA National Legislative Committee.

In addition to being involved in the Chester-Delaware County Farmers' Association, he has been a 4-H leader for 30 years and is also vice president of the Philadelphia Society for the Promotion of Agriculture.

"Leon truly epitomizes the meaning of the PFA Distinguished Service to Agriculture award winners," Eckel said.

The award is presented to a member of the agricultural community who has distinguished himself in support of and for the benefit of the agricultural industry.

"Leon has always taken along his love of agriculture to the vari-

ous committees in wich he has been involved, and always invites people to his farm. His point in all of this is to educate them so their applications to this aspect of society will be practical," said Barclay Hoopes, president of the Chester-Delaware County Farmers' Association.

Wilkinson, his wife Edna, and two of their four sons are involved in the family dairy operation, that involves 500 milking cows on 6,000 acres. They also raise about an equal number of replacement cattle and are involved in an embryo transfer business.

In other business, PFA members also honored retiring state House minority whip Samuel Haves for his 22 years of support of agriculture in the state General Assembly.

Rep. Hayes was presented with the PFA Barn Raiser award in recognition of representing Hungtindon and Blair counties and "working behind the scenes and in public in the budgetary process to promote agriculture and the funding of agricultural programs," according to Janet Carson, public relations spokesperson.

Hayes, who has been recognized for his efforts on behalf of agriculture by many other organizations, was also noted for being instrumental in helping get through the state agricultural farmland preservation program, serving on the conference committee to

complete its passage.

Also honored were Steven Jr. and Rebekah Gross, of Manchester, York County, who had been named as PFA's Outstanding Young Farmer Award recipients.


The annual award is presented to a PFA farmer, usually a couple, who has worked to improve the image of agriculture.


