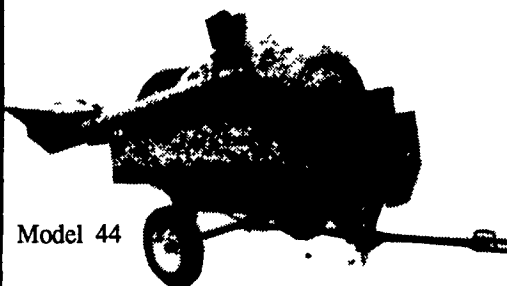

New England Shell Eggs

Wednesday, November 18, 1992

Trucklot buying interest in ready-to-cook fryers for immediate delivery was very light as the trade concentrates on other holiday items. Supplies of lighter weights were at least adequate, heavier sizes were in good balance. Shipper asking prices were generally unchanged; however, some 2.5 pound sizes were competitively priced to clear. Floor stocks were adequate. Movement into distributor and retail channels was light. The trade sentiment was steady at best. Retail features included whole legs at 69 - 99 cents, leg quarters at 49 - 59 cents, and thighs and drumsticks at 69 cents.

Prices were unchanged. Trade sentiment was steady to fully steady. Demand was spotty from moderate to very good. Supplies were generally adequate, and some plants ran overtime schedules to produce adequate graded floor stocks for the expected holiday demand.
