WHEAT PRICES CONTINUED LOWER ON NEGATIVE RUSSIAN NEWS; CORN AND BEAN PRICES MOVED SLIGHTLY HIGHER ON HIGHER THAN EXPECTED EXPORT INSPECTION FIGURES AND PROMISING EXPORT INTERESTS. WHEAT UNCHANGED TO 3 CENTS LOWER CORN UNCHANGED TO 3 CENTS HIGHER SORGHUM UNCHANGED TO 9 CENTS HIGHER. SOYBEANS 2 TO 5 CENTS HIGHER. RUSSIA'S FINANCIAL DIFFICULTIES CONTINUED TO WEAKEN WHEAT PRICES. ACTIVE FARMER SELLING ALSO A FACTOR. CORN AND BEAN PRICES REGAINED SOME OF RECENT LOSSES ON HIGHER THAN EXPECTED EXPORT INSPECTION FIGURES. NEWS SOUTH AFRICA IS INTERESTED IN 210,000 TONNES U.S. CORN ADDED SUPPORT TO CORN PRICES. SOUTH KOREA IS REPORTED TO HAVE BOUGHT 4.3 MILLION BUSHELS OF CHINESE CORN. REPORTS MEXICO RECENTLY BID FOR U.S. SOYBEAN BY-PRODUCTS PUSHED BEAN PRICES HIGHER.

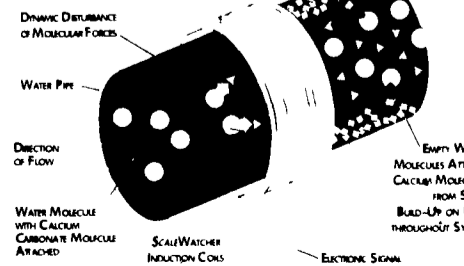
