NATIONAL EGG MARKET - AT A GLANCE: Prices were unchanged to lower in the Northeast and Midwest, unchanged elsewhere. The market tone continued unsettled, and was steady at best with post-holiday caution. Demand covered the full range, and was generally fair to fairly good. Retail restocking, and first-of-the-month demand were the most active. Supplies were adequate to fully adequate with the large sizes the most available. Breakers received adequate shell eggs, and remained unaggressive as finished product demand continued to be sluggish. Live hen offerings were at least adequate, and most plants worked capacity schedules from previous bookings; the undertone was steady at best.

Movement of ready-to-cook broiler/fryers varied from good to slowed. Offerings remained closely balanced to short. Live supplies were moderate to heavy; weights were desirable to often heavier than desired. Slaughter schedules were very heavy. Less than trucklot asking prices were 1 to 3 cents higher at 51 to 59 cents. Trade sentiment was fully steady to higher. In the parts complex, wings were in short supply. Inquiry for leg quarters had tapered at several points. Other items ranged balanced to short for immediate delivery. A few plants have noted plans to operate this upcoming weekend.
