French Toast

- 2 eggs, slightly beaten
- ½ cup milk
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- ¼ teaspoon vanilla
- ¼ teaspoon nutmeg, optional

Blend thoroughly. Quickly dip bread in egg mixture one piece at a time, just until moistened. Fry in hot skillet on each side until golden brown. Serve immediately with syrup or jelly.

Quick Pancake Syrup

- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1½ cups water
- 1 tablespoon cornstarch
- 1 teaspoon maple flavoring

Combine sugar, water, and cornstarch in a saucepan. Cook until slightly thickened, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Add 1 teaspoon maple flavoring. Serve.

Sweet Roll Dough

- 1 package yeast
- ½ cup warm water
- ½ cup warm milk
- ½ cup sugar
- ½ cup shortening
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 egg
- 3½ to 4 cups flour

Dissolve yeast in warm water. Stir in milk, sugar, shortening, salt, egg, and 2 cups flour. Beat until smooth. Mix in enough flour to make dough easy to handle. Turn onto floured surface; knead until smooth and elastic (about 5 minutes). Place in greased bowl, cover and let rise until double (about 1½ hours). Punch down and use with the following recipe.

Fireplace, Bake-Oven Cooking

ELIZABETHTOWN (Lancaster Co.) — Classes in open-hearth fireplace cooking and bake oven baking will be held at the Heritage House Museum, 43 East High Street, Elizabethtown.

The bake oven baking class will be held on Sunday, March 14 from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. in the recreated 1847 squirrel-tail bake oven at the museum. Cost of the class is \$30 for non-members and \$25 for members.

Tom Martin will instruct both classes. Martin, from Strasburg, has studied his art throughout the Northeast and taught at a variety of museums and other historic sites. Currently, he offers classes at the Landis Valley Museum and the Heritage House Museum.

After learning about wood, building the fire, preparing and either cooking or baking the food, students will partake in a hearty, flavorful fireplace meal or sample

the wonderful baked items.

Throughout the day, instructor Martin will offer entertaining bits of folklore and cultural information about our ancestors.

An additional class will be held on Sunday, April 18 from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. This class will be an advanced version of either fireplace cooking or bake oven baking depending on enrollment. The charge for this class is the same as above. Martin will also instruct this class.

Cinnamon Rolls

- ½ of sweet roll dough
- 2 tablespoons margarine, melted
- ¼ cup sugar
- 2 teaspoons cinnamon

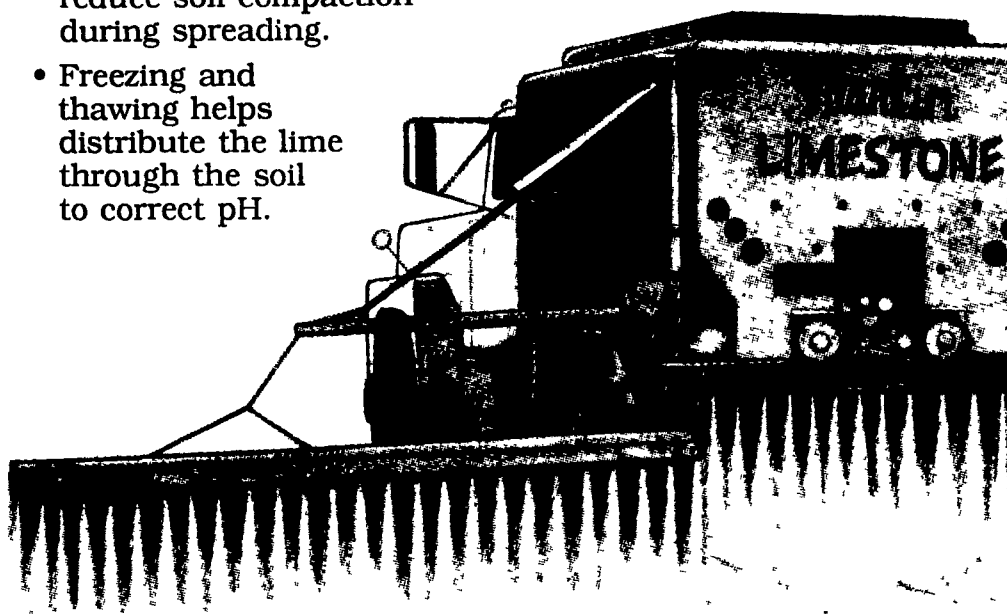
Roll dough very thin into triangle shape. Brush with melted butter, sprinkle with cinnamon and sugar. Roll up tightly. Pinch edge of dough to seal well. Cut into pieces about 1 inch wide. Place slightly apart in a greased round or square pan. Let rise until double (40 minutes). Bake at 375 degrees for 15 to 20 minutes or until golden brown. Spread with glaze while warm.

Glaze: Mix together until smooth:

- 1 cup confectioners' sugar
- 1 tablespoon milk
- ½ teaspoon vanilla

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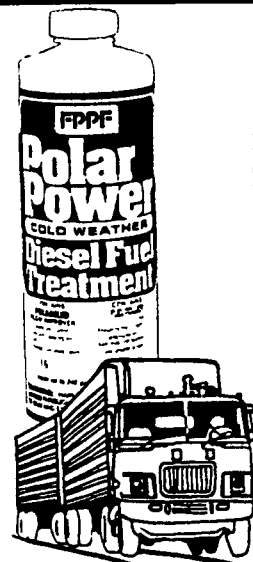
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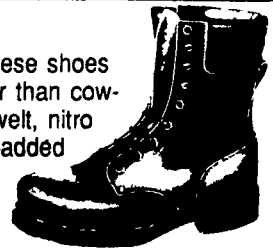
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
