"The white corn market currently accounts for less than 1 percent of seed corn acreage in the United States," Rice said. "However, it has experienced good growth in recent years, primarily due to the popularity of tacos and other Mexican foods.

non Co.) - The Lebanon County Agricultural Land Preservation Board has approximately \$590,000 available to purchase conservation easements on qualified county farms.

Roughly 13 percent of these funds have been appropriated by the Lebanon County Commissioners while the remainder comes from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Interested landowners should make an appointment with Charles Wertz at the Lebanon County Conservation District (272-3377) to learn further details of the application process.

Time is of the essence as funds not utilized by Lebanon County landowners by the end of 1993 will be reallocated to those counties spending their shares.

Round one of the county's program closes on April 30, at which time it is likely the county board will make offers to do appraisals for qualifying landowners.

Potential applicants can also apply to the program after April 30 in either of two remaining enrollment rounds.

To date, four Lebanon County farms totaling approximately 430 acres have been preserved. Two more farms totaling about 228 acres are likely to be preserved pending their approval by the state.

Candidates must be in an approved Agricultural Security Area in their municipality and meet several other criteria to qualify for the program.
