DOVER, Del. — Jeanne Robertson, a 6-2 former Miss North Carolina with a cache of "tall tales" will bring her seven-step plan for developing a sense of humor to the 23rd Annual Agricultural Industry Dinner on Saturday, March 20th.

The event will be held at the University of Delaware's Clayton Hall in Newark. This annual gathering enables farmers, agribusinessmen and policy makers a chance to discuss issues facing agriculture in the year ahead.

Author and humorist Robertson has been speaking professionally since 1963. What began as a necessity when she became Miss North Carolina, grew into a hobby and eventually a career.

Robertson has a degree from Auburn University and taught

physical education in high school and college and coached basketball for many years. But, it was apparent that people enjoyed her humorous style of speaking more than anything.

She became a member of the National Speakers Association and was elected president in 1985-86. She was presented with the Association's Cavett Award in 1989, the NAS's most prestigious honor. She was the first woman to receive the honor.

Her self-deprecating humor elicits laughter, but her message inspires all of us to accept ourselves and others for what they are and to have the confidence to succeed in life.

Robertson appeared at the annual Delmarva Poultry Industry, Inc. banquet several years ago.

pounds of fat and 1,230 pounds of protein in the Tullar herd.

Tullando Admiral Van, Maxima's sixth dam made a 305-day record with 22,530 pounds of milk and 808 pounds of fat (3.6 percent) in her first lactation, which

began in 1966.

Veronica, the seventh dam, made 19,480 pounds of 3.5 percent milk in 294 days in 1963. And in 1949, the tenth dam made 19,236 pounds of 3.7 percent milk in 305 days.

As for type, the dam and grand-

am were both Very Good.

The great-grandam, Tullando Cal Meg, was Nancy Tullar's first show calf, she too, scored 85. Maxima's sixth dam, Tullando Admiral Van, shown by Deborah Tullar at Eastern States Exposition, was named grand champion cow in 1966; she was scored 87.

The tenth and eleventh dam in the pedigree were scored 85 and 87, respectively.

Maxima is more than a genetic aberration. She and her family are an integral part of the Tullando Farm heritage.
