


(Continued from Page A1) Duroc breed was an entry by Eugene Harbold, of Dillsburg, which placed third in the open gilt competition.



Committee appointments were also made.



Extension Offers Beef **Management Short Course**

WESTMINSTER, Md. — The Cooperative Extension Service offices in Carroll and Howard counties are inviting beef cattle producers to participate in the Central Maryland Beef Management Short Course, scheduled for consecutive Tuesday nights, March 16, 23, and 30.

The three-session program will be held at the Eldersburg Public Library, off Route 26 just east of Route 32 in southern Carroll County, and will run from 7:30 p.m. to 9:45 p.m. each night.

Topics on the program include

feeding and finishing cattle, a computer rations worksession comparing forages of different qualities and where they fit into a cow herd feeding program, nutritional management of the cow herd, measuring costs and profitability in your cow herd, alternative feedstuffs for beef cattle, update on growth promotants, and developing a sound herd health management program.

Speakers involved in the program are extension beef and livestock marketing specialists, an extension livestock veterinarian, and county extension agents from Maryland and Pennsylvania.

Because of space limitations at the library, participation is limited to the first 60 people who register. Cost of the short course is \$15 per person or family and includes handout materials and refreshments.
