Movement of ready-to-cook whole birds was slow at some plants, fair at others. Offerings varied in a range of fully adequate to readily available and difficult to place. Live supplies were generally moderate; weights were mostly desirable. Processing schedules were heavy. Less than trucklot asking prices were unchanged at 49 to 60 cents. Trade sentiment was steady/weak. In the parts complex, boneless skinless breasts and leg quarters were fully adequate, instances ample. Bone-in breasts were noted as adequate and in best balance. Wings were irregularly balanced, and for some, slow to clear.
