WHEAT 2 TO 9 CENTS HIGHER. CORN UNCHANGED TO 1 CENT HIGHER. SORGHUM 2 TO 6 CENTS HIGHER. SOYBEANS UNCHANGED TO 2 CENTS LOWER. WHEAT PRICES WERE BOOSTED BY GOOD EXPORT SALES AND USDA'S TARGETING OF TURKEY FOR 200,000 TONNES SUBSIDIZED U.S. WHEAT.
OPTIMISM FOR INCREASED MOVE-MENT OF U.S. GRAIN TO RUSSIA CONTINUES DESPITE POLITICAL PROBLEMS. SLIGHT GAINS WERE MADE IN CORN PRICES ON CCC TEN-DERS LINEUP FOR DONATIONS AND TUESDAY'S ANNOUNCEMENT THAT ETHANOL SOULD BE EXEMPT FROM THE CLINTON ADMINISTRATION'S PROPOSED ENERGY TAX. LACK OF NEW EXPORT SALES AND REPORTED FARMER SELLING LIM-ITED PRICE ADVANCES. WEAKNESS WAS NOTED IN SOYBEAN PRICES AS PROFIT TAKING ON THE BOARD AND ACTIVE COUNTRY SELLING PRESSURED PRICES. IMPROVED EXPORT SALES OF BEAN BY-PRODUCTS CURBED DECLINES IN SOYBEAN PRICES.
