UMBRELLAS: A BRIEF HISTORY

mbrellas were first used in ancient Mesopotamia as sunshades and were later adopted by women in ancient Greece and Rome In the first century A D., Roman women began oiling their paper sunshades to provide rain protection, and the umbrella as we know it was born. But it was not until the eighteenth century that umbrellas became acceptable for men Beginning in 1750, Jonas Hanway always carried an umbrella around London, rain or shine. This was

seen as effeminate, and he was publicly humiliated and ridiculed, but gradually the stigma faded and the idea took hold When Hanway died in 1786, all proper British gentlemen were using umbrellas

½ cup lemon juice 2 tablespoons mustard % teaspoon resemany

Demand good. Trade active. Overall condtions and quality not as attractive to buyers as last week. Quality of supply plain to attractive, most plain to average. Weigh-ups widely var. average to thin fleshed. Slaughter cows \$2.00-\$3.00 lower. Slaughter bulls averaging \$1.00 lower. Run this week 9,931; last week 10,658; last year 10,390. Receipts 72% feeders over 600 lbs.; 24% calves and light yearlings under 600 lbs.; 4% cows and bulls. Bulk price ranges follow.



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
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
