Movement of ready-to-cook whole birds remained good overall, especially on 3 pound and lighter sizes. Heavier weights were at least adequate. Live supplies were generally moderate; weights were desirable to heavier than desired. Processing schedules were very heavy. Less than trucklot asking prices were unchanged to mostly 1 cent higher at 54 to 65 cents. Trade sentiment was firm to higher. In the part complex, breast items were noted as short or closely balanced, particularly bone-in breasts. Leg quarters were adequ ate to barely adequate and firmly held at most plants.
